

Abrahamsen Works for wind quintet Ensemble MidtVest



Hans Abrahamsen's music is having a moment in the spotlight, and this is another excellent

contribution from the Ensemble MidtVest. 1970s wind quintets open the programme, followed by loving arrangements of Schumann's Kinderszenen and Ravel's Le tombeau de Couperin. (RF) ★★★

Chopin Piano Concerto No. 1; solo pieces (selection) Seong-Jin Cho (piano); Warsaw Philharmonic Orchestra/Kaspszyk Fryderyk Chopin Institute NIFCCD625



A staggering live recording of the 2015 International Fryderyk Chopin Competition winner

as he progresses through the rounds. Seong-Jin Cho's playing has depth of colour and a mature sense of line. The orchestra sounds a little woolly in the concerto. (OC) ★★★★

Enescu Piano Trio No. 1 Arenksy Piano Trio No. 1 Trio Enescu

Captivating
performances of
contrasting lateRomantic trios that

more often. Composed in his teenage years, the Enescu is a joyful splash of folkiness, while the Arensky, composed in memory of a beloved cellist colleague, Karl Davydov, plunges us into deeper emotional waters. (JP) ***

Puts Symphony No. 2; Flute Concerto; River's Rush Adam Walker (flute); Peabody Symphony Orchestra/Marin Alsop Naxos 8.559794



Kevin Puts (b1972) is a contemporary American composer. His Symphony No. 2 – a musical illustration

of the events of 9/11 – is movingly performed under the direction of Marin Alsop, alongside some of his lighter music. (EC) ★★★★

Reger Sonatas for Violin Solo

Reger's wonderful, Romantic music for solo violin is heavily influenced by Bach's Sonatas and Partitas

down to the majestic Chaconne of the Fourth Sonata. Virtuosic as well as lyrical, rich and enticing, Wallin shapes it all with great skill. The recorded sound is very close and a little harsh at times. (OC) ★★★★

Shostakovich

String Quartets Nos 11, 8, 5; Elegy Debussy Quartet

Three quartets, one from each period of Shostakovich's life, are programmed in reverse order. The

Debussy Quartet plays assuredly and expressively throughout, with moments of fizzing energy. Shostakovich's Elegy, which opens the disc, offers a welcome moment of sweetness in this intense collection. (EC) ***

Smith Jacobite; plus Rachmaninov & Corea/Smith Tommy Smith (saxophone); BBC

Scottish Symphony Orchestra/Clark Rundell Spartacus Records STSO22



Saxophonist Tommy Smith leads us onto the orchestral battlefield in a three-movement work that traces

Jacobite history from the risings of 1689 to the catastrophe of Culloden. Suitably dramatic, with occasional bluesy solo moments. (JP) ★★★

Stravinsky Petrushka Debussy La boite à jouxjoux (arr. Caplet) Seattle Symphony/Ludovic Morlot

Seattle Symphony/Ludovic Morlot *Seattle Symphony Media SSM*1010-



This recording's unforgiving close acoustic doesn't take any prisoners, but the Seattle Symphony

conquers any dryness with its vivacious playing. The Stravinsky is tightly rhythmic and the suavity in the Debussy is a joy. (OC) ★★★

Tchaikovsky The Seasons; Grand Sonata in G major Jonas Vitaud (piano)

Mirare MIR 308



Vitaud's year sadly lacks seasonal colour as he plods prosaically from one month to the next. June's Barcarolle

and October's Autumn Song notably fail to sing, and September's Hunt gets stuck in the woodland mud. The Grand Sonata fares better. (JP) ★★

Van der Aa Violin Concerto; Hysteresis

Janine Jansen (violin); Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra/Jurowski; Kari Kriikku (clarinet); Amsterdam Sinfonietta/Candida Thompson Disquiet DQM 05



Janine Jansen captivates in the 2014 Violin Concerto written for her by Van der Aa, full of energy and cool

beauty. *Hysteresis* (2013) offers an invigorating blend of analogue and digital sounds. (RF) ★★★★

Van Dieren 'Chinese' Symphony; plus other orchestral works Raphael Wallfisch (cello); Soloists; BBC National Orchestra and Chorus of Wales/William Boughton Lyrita SRCD.357



The 'Chinese' of the title refers to the poems sung, in German translation, by a quintet of soloists

and chorus. The English composer's 1912 symphony is a dreamy, late-Romantic wallow. Atmospheric, in a Delius-like way, but not hugely memorable. (JP) ★★★

Zelenka Six Trio Sonatas Zefiro Arcana A394



Close miking brings an immediacy to this addictive recording of music by the 18th-century Czech

challenger to Bach. Consummate playing make this two-disc set a winner. (OC) ★★★★

Airs, Blues and Dances

Tippett, Bennett, Weir, Bray, Matthews, Grime, Tavener et al James Turnbull (oboe), Libby Burgess (piano); Ensemble Perpetuo Champs Hill Records CHRCD099



This is a beautifully played, interestingly programmed showcase of the oboe as a recital instrument. Highlights

include pastoral Bennett, jazzy David Matthews and refreshing Weir and Bray. (RF) ★★★★

Aksel! Arias by Bach, Handel & Mozart Aksel Rykkvin (treble); OAE/Short Signum SIGCD435



Exceptionally polished performances and, one or two clipped bits of phrasing aside, mightily impressive

vocal control from the 13-year-old Norwegian treble. The arias are wellchosen. (JP) ★★★★

Ave Maria Music for Upper Voices The St Catharine's Girls' Choir. Cambridge/Edward Wickham Resonus RES10170



An imaginative disc of 20th-century and contemporary music including works by Rebecca Clarke and

Cecilia McDowall. The young voices blend well, and sing with conviction and warmth. (OC) ★★★

Encuentro Songs by Falla & Lorca Morente (singer), Perianes (piano) Harmonia Mundi HMC 902246



The smoky colours and grainy edges of flamenco singer Estrella Morente's voice add an authentic

Spanish flavour to Falla and Lorca's folk-inspired songs. She's deftly partnered by Perianes. (RF) ★★★

Hakim plays Hakim

Naji Hakim (organ) Signum Classics SIGCD463



Hakim is a composer of great individuality and wit. Harmonies from the French organ school and his native

Middle East combine deliciously. He gets some thrilling colours from the Schuke organ in Bilbao. (OC) ★★★★

Latino ladino: Songs of exile and passion from Spain and **Latin America**

Yaniv d'Or (countertenor), Ensemble Naya, Barrocade/Amit Tiefenbrunn Naxos 8.573566



The brainchild of Yaniv d'Or, this programme of mostly traditional and Baroque music that flourished in

exiled communities is performed with panache by the countertenor and the period group he founded, Ensemble NAYA. (EC) ★★★★

Roma Æterna Works by Palestrina, Victoria and Guerrero **New York Polyphony** BIS BIS-2203



A polished performance from New York Polyphony of music by great Renaissance masters.

While the choral sound could be more characterful, the solos are beautifully expressive.

The Lost Songs of St Kilda

There's a certain charm to these piano pieces, even if the remarkable story of their provenance

takes some believing. The orchestral arrangements that follow are a mixed bag, and the sentimental sleevenotes splendidly ludicrous. (JP) ★★★

The Stanford Legacy Works by Stanford, Clarke and Ireland Martin Outram (viola), Julian Rolton (piano) Nimbus NI 6334



This disc draws together the music of Stanford and two of his pupils, Rebecca Clarke and John

Ireland, in touching and convincing performances. (EC) ★★★★

Vox Clara

Music by Gabriel Jackson Joel Garthwaite (saxophone), Luke Bond (organ) Truro Cathedral Choir/ Christopher Gray Regent REGCD479



VOX CLARA A former chorister. Gabriel Jackson writes imaginatively scored and expressive choral music, here performed

Many happy returns

Our reissue round-up salutes Reger, Goerne and Price

This Warner Classics

set champions

The centenary of Reger's death may have slipped a little under the radar in terms of new releases this year, but Warner Classics's **Reger: The Centenary Collection** (0190295974824: 8 CDs) does its bit to champion the German's genius. It's not comprehensive you won't find, for instance, his four Tone Poems after Arnold Böcklin or Sonatas for Solo Violin – but it is wide-ranging, and adorned by performances

from the likes of mezzo Christa Ludwig and the Hilliard Ensemble.

Reger's genius Celebrating a milestone next year, meanwhile, will be German baritone Matthias Goerne, who turns

50 in March. Harmonia Mundi starts the celebrations early with a complete edition of his **Schubert Lieder** recordings (HMX 2908750.61). Included in this sumptuous 12-disc display of the Lieder singer's craft are, of course, the great song-cycles Die schöne Müllerin, Winterreise and Schwanengesang, along with less

familiar fare.

Prima Donna Assoluta collection (88985311342) showcases many of the US soprano's finest operatic roles, from Fiordiligi in Mozart's Così fan Tutte to Verdi's Aida and Puccini's Tosca, all in remastered recordings, many of the performances conducted by Erich Leinsdorf.

Dating from the late 1950s and early '60s, meanwhile, are the recordings that comprise Decca's new Beethoven Monteux

> - The Nine **Symphonies** set (480 8895). As well as those nine symphonies,

we also hear the great French-American maestro – by then in his 80s – conduct the London Symphony, Vienna Philharmonic and Royal Concertgebouw orchestras in the *Fidelio*, *Egmont* and King Stephen overtures and a fascinating rehearsal sequence.

And, sticking with Beethoven, Alpha Classics brings us his complete string quartets, performed by the Belcea Quartet (Alpha 262; 8 CDs). These

are high-octane, imrnaculately played performances from one of today's rnost exciting string quartets. Well worth a pre-Christmas investment.
